

New Blacker RA's

Blacker House is welcoming two new resident associates after having been RA-starved since the beginning of second term. The new couple were voted in by house members the end of November.

Doug Flamming and Judith Crothers have been married for four years and living in Pasadena for two years; Flamming has been a history professor at Caltech for those two years. Earlier he taught at Virginia Tech and has a degree from Vanderbilt University. Crothers is working in an internship as she finishes the last year of her psychology Ph.D. from Vanderbilt. Flamming is a Texas native; Crothers is from Indiana.

It is perhaps bewildering why any human would volunteer to be an RA, however Crothers clarified the confusion when she admitted insanity, however, she also felt that by becoming RAs they would become closely involved with a community such as Caltech. She added "That in some weird way we like the students," but then conceded, "There's no other way to like them."

Flamming enjoys playing basketball recreationally; Crothers like to hike with their two dogs. The new RAs bring two new pets to Blacker: a pair of large black dogs, California Wow (simply "Cali") and D.D.

Remodeling of the RA apartment has been ongoing since the

end of December. Besides general renovations, modifications are being made to accommodate the two dogs. Specifically, a door and ramp are being added to the room so that the dogs can have access to the area between Blacker and California Blvd. If construction is completed on time, the RAs will move in on February 15.

The concept of the resident associate represents an attempt at putting professors and graduate students in the living environment of the undergraduates. Flamming is enthusiastic about this idea: "I'm hoping to break some of the barriers between faculty and undergraduates. There shouldn't be any barriers. Unless we make efforts to come together, it won't happen." The RAs idea represents a facet of a larger program that the administration is currently examining. One idea is the construction of an experimental graduate/undergraduate/faculty living complex. Flamming, open to new ideas, is "very positive on that approach."

Flamming and Crothers replace John and Lynn Salmon as Blacker RAs. The Salmons, who were RAs for five and one-half years, moved out at the end of first term when John finished work on his graduate degree.

Crothers, in all sincerity, said "We are looking forward to getting to know Blacker students. Boring, but true."

Ethical Issues of the Genome Surmountable

The ethical issues of the human genome initiative are surmountable while the benefits of the research appear prodigious, according to the speaker at last week's genome seminar.

Thomas Caskey, Director and Investigator in the Department of Molecular Genetics at Baylor College of Medicine, in his Thursday evening lecture presented technical details of disease diagnosis through genetic information.

In an interview afterwards, he commented on the difficult questions which might arise. Indeed, questions have already begun to surface as new methods become more common. Occasionally, an examination of a family's genetic history, useful in identifying heritable diseases, inadvertently uncovers an unfortunate hospital error or a wife's unfaithfulness.

Amniocentesis, a means of determining the sex and other characteristics of a fetus, can evince a disease or physical disorder. If the doctor informs the parents, he may provoke an abortion, but if he refrains, the usual bonding might escape an unprepared mother.

A potentially more onerous problem lies in the morality of genetic enhancements. Adducing

the popularity of vaccines and cosmetic surgery and the increasing usage of growth hormones, Caskey suggested that single-generation enhancements will be readily accepted. However, permanent "gene-line" operations, asserted Caskey, will not be tolerated.

Caskey believes that the greatest problems will be institutional rather than ethical; science will give more knowledge than can be accommodated. He referred to an expanding "education gap." Older, less effective methods are still often used in many areas of medicine.

Coincidentally, a woman in the audience had been closely involved with one of the enhancements named by Caskey. She had allowed the administration of growth hormones to her son, who now stands a few inches beyond his once predicted height of just over five feet. The woman called the new technology "very exciting and scary."

Maybe the days are not so far away when the phrase "model child" will denote more than behavioral flawlessness.

The Date Rapist Next Door

One out of every three women will be raped at one point in their lifetime.

Think about it.

Look around you, and find the three closest women. This may even include you. Of those three, one of them will be the victim of sexual violence. One of them will be forced to do something they do not want to do.

Think about it.

Then think about this: Nearly eighty-five percent of those women raped know their assailant. And of those that know their assailants, over half are on a date. The couple you saw at the Coffeehouse, or at the ASCIT movie, or even walking down the Olive Walk, may be one of these statistics. And do not think that Caltech is immune to rape, because there is nothing special about this place that prevents sexual violence. In fact, Caltech may be even more susceptible to sexual harassment and acquaintance than most colleges.

Think about it.

Most people think of rape as the strange attacker, who threatens to kill a woman if she does not comply. This is actually the exception.

New Fire Station

To address this problem, the Master of Student Houses, in cooperation with the Health Advocates and Administration, will be sponsoring a panel of local experts and staff to visit the houses and run discussions.

On this panel are: Pat Bowie, who is the Assistant Director of Education and Coordinator for the YWCA Rape Crisis Center; Joseph Megel, who is co-host of Morning Magazine on KPFK and has been on panels at other colleges like USC and Occidental; Kendall Segel-Evans, who is a Counselor and co-founder of "Another Way, Exploring Alternatives to Violence and Control"; and Michelle Vine, who is a secretary in the Physics department here at Caltech and a volunteer Counselor for the Rape Crisis Hot Line.

The three non-Tech members have been on similar panels at other local colleges, while all four have been dealing with the "survivors"

of sexual assault for many years.


The program is very similar to last year's AIDS program, and is presently just being started. The pilot dinner was last Thursday evening at the MOSH's temporary housing. Invited were the ex- and present presidents of all the houses, the Health Advocates, and others. Offering free dinner attracted a good turn out, and led to a lively discussion.

Being the pilot for the program, which has yet to be scheduled, there was criticism and praise for the panel after the presentation. With this information the panel is planning and preparing to bring their discussion to the houses for all who are interested.

The panel hopes to bring the problem of acquaintance rape out into the open and to encourage communication among the students. They want make the students aware of the problem, so that they can understand it and deal with it properly. Helping those who have gone through such an ordeal is very difficult. "Survivors" are present everywhere, even where you least expect them. Look around you at those three women.

Boo for Drugs

To the editors:

The following letter has been sent to all Caltech students.

Caltech, like other schools throughout the country, regards the unlawful use of drugs and alcohol by students as a matter of serious concern. Moreover, all of us in this community, whether employees or students, have to meet our responsibilities under the law. Recent amendments to Title XII of the federal Higher Education Act of 1965 will require that all colleges and universities have "implemented a program to prevent the use of illicit drugs and abuse of alcohol by students and employees." By the beginning of the next academic year, Caltech must certify that we are following these guidelines or else face the loss of all federal funding, including aid to students. In order to satisfy the requirements of the new law, Caltech will soon organize a process through which students, faculty and staff can work together to develop a detailed policy.

In the interim, students should recognize that the California Institute of Technology has long prohibited, use, manufacture and

distribution of illegal drugs on campus. Besides the obvious implications for individual activity, it is important for houses (undergraduate and graduate residences) and student organizations to note that the following are also prohibited:

- 1) consumption of illegal drugs at house or club events
- 2) house traditions that involve the use of illegal drugs
- 3) drug paraphernalia in the houses or supplied by a house
- 4) use of Institute, house, or student organization funds to buy illegal substances.

Caltech employees who observe violations will not ignore them. Severe consequences for individuals and houses may result from failure to adhere to these prohibitions.

book review

Rimrunners
by C. J. Cherryh
Questar, \$4.95

Rimrunners is another hard-SF work by Cherryh, in the same vein as *Downbelow Station* and her other best novels. For those of you who haven't read her work, Cherryh has won two Hugo awards for works in this series, one for *Downbelow Station* (a truly great novel) and another for *Cyteen* (a truly loooooong novel). They take place in a future in which Earth has decided to colonize at least a few local stars by use of slower-than-light ships. The problem then arose of how to govern these new planets at a distance in time and space. The resulting problems, along with the discovery of a slightly faster-than-light drive, led to a war in space, somewhat like the historical fighting between English and Spanish ships during the colonization of the New World. Including some of the fighting ships turning pirate...

Rimrunners is much more enjoyable if you are already familiar with the other books of the series, especially *Downbelow Station*, but I think it stands well on its own. Everything but the technology of the ships is clear within the book,

and you can just accept the hardware.

The story centers on Bet Yeager, who had been a career Marine on the fleet that originally had fought on Earth's side in the war. Then, as recounted in the earlier books, Earth negotiated a settlement that left the Fleet hanging out to dry (for very good reasons, but still...). Circumstances have led her to trying to make a living doing minor shipwork at a dying port. Then, all hell breaks loose.

Forced to quickly find a berth and ship out, she ends up signing on board a starship that is working for the side she had been fighting against... maybe.

Bet Yeager is *not* a likeable character. She's vicious, violent, amoral, and a host of other things that you wouldn't want to meet in a dark alley. But she has guts, brains, and is somehow *convincing*. That's where Cherryh really shines as a writer. Her characters grab you even if you wouldn't like them as people.

Rimrunners is another good one from C.J. Cherryh. It's not as "literary" as *Cyteen*, but it's a lot more readable, and worth buying.

The California Tech is supposed to be ASCIT's newspaper; a newspaper for and about the undergraduates of this school. It should have relevance, and humor, and be a place for the exchange of both raw information and the varied opinion it evokes. *The Tech* has rarely, if ever, lived up to this challenge. While it may or may not be humorous, it has almost never been relevant. Few of its stories are meaningful to students. Many meaningful stories never seem to be written. Most of the content of *The Tech*, in fact, is based entirely on who bothers to write.

These things should change. There is no reason *The Tech* cannot be a significant and entertaining paper.

The first change we would make would be to the content of the stories reported. The use of PR bulletins from the Office thereof should be minimal since it is unclear how much the story "Prof. John Doe Wins Award for Meatloaf Recipe" really is important to undergraduates, and we can read *On Campus* for such things. Stories for *The Tech* should have a different emphasis: for instance, how will the Beckman Institute affect us? What exactly is this mysterious "new admissions policy?" We will have, on an occasional basis, interviews with significant people within Caltech. There will be an emphasis on keeping stories even-handed, so that they express what's really going on, and not just one person's opinion.

Emphasis will also be placed on the timeliness of stories. A small space will be devoted each week to announcing any signups for committees or representatives; currently many positions are filled before

most of us know what happened. Important meetings will be announced beforehand so that no one is left saying "I wish I had known about that..."

If necessary, we will write these stories ourselves. While four editors may seem like a lot, we have estimated the time required, and think that four editors can do a better overall job than three. Our team includes a member of every class, so our workloads should not be simultaneous. However, our true goal is to increase community involvement with *The Tech*, so that it reflects the views and interests of the entire community, not just three randomly selected undergraduates. The only prerequisite for writing a story is interest. Toward this end, we intend to make it as easy as possible to submit articles, by allowing e-mail submission, and without restricting articles to Wordstar formatted disks. We know how to type.

But reporting is only half of *The Tech's* job; the other half is to provide a forum for opinions—everyone's opinions. To encourage communication between the various groups on campus, we will invite important members of ASCIT, the graduate student body, the faculty and the administration to write "guest editorials," which we will print unedited, for the purpose of generating discussion—and letters—on a variety of topics. Each week our staff will also write an editorial: one that is polite, but effective. For example, while you may never read one entitled "In Search of Vertebrates on the IHC," you could very well find one called "How ASCIT Could Serve Us Better." The object will not be to extol the opinions of the editors, but to encourage debate. Letters with opposing viewpoints will be accepted and printed with glee.

The purpose behind all this is to make *The Tech* more fun, by making it more interesting. The paper should be worth reading from cover to cover, and not just be a vehicle for the Inside World and Crime Beat. Those currently associated with *The Tech* have been given more than enough time to improve it, and have failed; they will not miraculously start to do better after this election. What *The Tech* needs most right now is not a new set of typesetter operators, but good editors.

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

Room 8 of Parsons-Gates Hall of Administration is a goldmine waiting to be discovered. It is the location of the Career Development Center, an invaluable organization dedicated to helping Caltech students.

Nestled in the basement beneath the Registrar's and Dean's office, the Career Development Center offers a myriad of services to students. Whether you are a freshman or a senior, graduate student or Research Fellow, the Center can aid you.

Each year, 400 to 600 students take advantage of the Center's personalized service. This includes counseling and advice about interviews, resumes, or applying to graduate school. The Center is also one of the best ways to get in touch with the 150 to 200 companies that come to Caltech each year to recruit employees. The Center hosts a Caltech Career Day in February, giving students a chance to interact with prospective employers. Also available in the Center is a Career Resources Library, providing pamphlets and handouts on all types of pertinent topics, free to the Caltech community. Also in this library are catalogs and directories on schools, foreign study, and scholarships.

But the Center is not just for graduating seniors looking for jobs. The Center can also give aid to students thinking of transferring or taking a leave of absence. They can give ideas on what to do while you're not currently in school. This leads to the Center's great value in finding part-time, work-study, or summer jobs. The Center has a computerized job search program which can find the right job or career for you. But the Center's greatest asset is its friendly and helpful staff. They can give you individual attention and advice, and as much information and help as you can handle—as this reporter continued on page 9

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Is Your Valentine Breaking Your Heart?

As Valentine's Day approaches, the Caltech-Prototypes Student Consultation Program and the Staff and Faculty Consultation Center are focusing on the topic of interpersonal relationships.

Mutually satisfying relationships are vital to human happiness but can be difficult to initiate and maintain. Even the best relationships have their ups and downs. Sometimes it is difficult to even *begin* dating or making friends. Are you wondering about the significant relationships in your life? Is intimacy difficult to achieve? Are your relationships hurting you? Do you often give more than you receive? Are you worried about your partner's emotional state or behavior?

Difficulties with emotional intimacy come about for a variety of reasons. In some cases, we have learned ways of relating to one another from our earlier family relationships which no longer work well for us. We find ourselves acting out roles from our past with current friends and lovers despite the ineffectiveness of these roles. For example, one partner may be quiet, unexpressive and withdrawn, while the other is overly talkative, dramatically expressive, and emotional. Or one partner may be more demanding, controlling or troubled, while the more compliant, caretaking partner struggles to meet these demands at the expense of his or her own needs. It can be hard to break out of these roles despite feeling trapped and resentful, especially when we are not aware of the roles or positions we have assumed.

In other cases, we enter relationships with unrealistically high expectations of others which are disappointed as the relationship progresses. Sometimes two people have different ideas about the level of commitment and the degree of closeness they each desire. Open communication is necessary for

these expectations to be clearly evaluated and to avoid anger and feelings of betrayal later on in the relationship.

Some people struggle to simply initiate contact with friends or potential lovers because of shyness, fears of rejection, and the fear of becoming vulnerable to another person. Examining and conquering these fears is a difficult but necessary step toward achieving intimate, satisfying relationships. Dating is a skill that requires practice, experimentation, and the ability to maintain one's confidence even after disappointment and rejection.

Some of us find ourselves choosing, or remaining involved in, relationships which we know are somewhat unhealthy, unfulfilling or even destructive, despite our better judgment. It can feel impossible to separate from a friend or lover with emotional problems or from a loved one who is abusing substances, even when he or she is unable to engage in a mutual, give-and-take relationship. Resentments on both sides can easily build in such relationships. Knowing how to help a depressed, confused or troubled friend or lover without taking on his or her problems as your own is hard. Often we need to explore our investment in playing the role of caretaker, and our fears of separating from such relationships, in order to be truly helpful to people.

Developing and maintaining healthy relationships will be the focus of a noontime talk on Tuesday, February 13 in Winnett Lounge, presented by Aimee Ellicott, Ph.D., of the Student Consultation Program and Adele Fleming-Walch, L.C.S.W., of the Staff and Faculty Consultation Center. The program will discuss strategies for improving communication and increasing insight into interpersonal relationships. It is open to the entire Caltech community. 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
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

Men's Tennis Intimidates Bay Area Teams

Last weekend, Caltech's men's tennis team traveled 400 miles north to the Bay area, and indeed what a trip it was. Leaving Pasadena after winning its season opener, CIT extended its record to 2-0 by defeating Menlo College 5-4 on perfect Friday afternoon. The team then played a friendly scrimmage against St. Mary's College, a division I school, but returned home to suffer its first defeat against Southern California College (SCC), a rematch from the previous week.

After the long drive and a night's rest, the team began Friday morning with the trip to Menlo College, a small school about one mile north of Stanford. Finding a few tennis balls a player "borrowed" from Caltech, the team warmed up in beautiful, clean northern California air. However, Menlo must have been so scared of the Pasadena players that many failed to show up. In the matches that did occur, here are the results.

In the number one spot, Dan Pang banged his way to win the first set 6-2 in an impressive display of consistency, control, and cunning, but his opponent fought back hard and stole the match away in three sets. Hemant Keny, playing number two, had some difficulty sparking his tennis fire, got a little singed in a two-set loss. Keny, shortly after the match, replied in his typical Hemant voice, "It was stellar."

Jimmy Ng, in third singles, dropped the first set, but picked up his play to tie the match at a set each. Throwing all he could into his game, Ng caught a load of opposition, losing in a heavy three-set defeat. In other singles action, Bappa Mukherji, Seung-Won "Wan" Hwang, and Chris Ho won as they were so awesome and totally invincible that the Menlo foes decided it was better not to play than to get crushed by the battling Beavers of Caltech. [OK, so I'm exaggerating just a bit.]

In doubles, Hwang and Robert Liu accepted victory as they too scared off the third doubles team with their mere presence. Pang and Mukherji, as the second spot pair, ran straight into a full house of opposing players shots, folding in two sets.

This led to a 4-4 tie, to be decided by the first doubles team of Keny and Ng. After losing the first set, Keny, recuperating from his "stellar" singles play, found his game and produced a symphony of solid serves and volleys. Ng, also turned up the volume with harmonious approach shots and net play, fine tuning his service returns which impressed even Coach Jackson. With this melodious spectrum of play, Ng and Keny orchestrated their comeback, winning 4-6, 6-3, 6-3, also capturing the day for Caltech.

The team was then supposed to continue on against Dominican College, but once again, the mere presence of the Caltech players wreaked havoc on the opposing team. This time, however, Caltech must have been so awesome that Dominican College had no team or coach to even speak of. (I guess they heard we were coming, so they all quit and went to Siberia.) As a result, Caltech arranged a scrimmage, an unofficial meeting with St. Mary's College.

After driving through some obscure roads, the players found themselves in the athletics fields of a division I school. (This means these guys are really good.) Located off in the boonies, the school environment seemed much like the rolling highlands of Scotland. High, cold winds blew through the CIT players, as they watched a rugby game in action. [Ah, I can hear the bagpipes far in the distance...]

The scrimmage started well, but soon turned frigid as the winds picked up and the rain pouring down. The tennis courts were brand new and had yet to be equipped with wind tarps, so the wind tended to disturb the normal path of tennis balls. (For example, Ho and his opponent found themselves standing on the downwind side of the court, knowing that the ball would always be blown there.)

Returning home, the Beavers met SCC once again, but plagued with recent injuries, lost to the visiting team. Pang, in the first spot, overcame a slow first set loss to win 1-6, 7-6 (7-5), 6-2. Ng, as #2, also played a tiebreak, but lost in two-sets.

Mukherji, ceding the first set, became revitalized as he out-

psyched his opponent with superb, exciting passing shots, low and out of reach to the SCC player. The opponent, as big and tall as he was, fell hard as Caltech's "David" beat "Goliath" 4-6, 6-2, 6-2. Greg Wardle, Liu, and Ho found tough match-ups, losing in three, two, and two sets respectively.

In third doubles, Chad Roberts was paired in his first varsity match with Ho, and after a set of warming up, the doubles team bravely broke back to stay on serve, getting into a tiebreak. In the end, however, CIT lost the second set, dropping the seesawed tiebreak 8-10. In second doubles, Ng and Mukherji also fell in two sets.

In the final match of the day, first doubles Pang and Danny Chu covered the entire court with precision, winning points with an assortment of groundstrokes, volleys, and other putaways, as they crushed the SCC team 6-4, 7-6 (7-4), sending SCC home with something to think about.

As the evening came to a close, Caltech left with a 2-1 record. And in the hours that followed, the players had a chance to reminisce about their experiences of the weekend.

The team embarks on the trip north Thursday afternoon, taking two station wagons loaded full of tennis gear and luggage, music and walkmans, eight guys and the coach.

Obviously, this is not just any road trip.

Enjoying relaxing conversation, Coach Jackson asks, "By the way, did anyone bring any tennis balls?" (Oops!)

Wondering about the slow traffic, the team sees something in the middle of the road covered by a white sheet, surrounded by pools of red stuff, with cops and flares

abound.

And the tennis hasn't even started.

Friday, Chris and the team are invited to a Stanford party. The offer is turned down.

Friday night, Bappa convinces the team to go out for ice cream, resulting in a 30-minute search for a Baskin & Robbins.

Saturday night at Caltech, Coach makes Jimmy, Wan, Chris and Bappa carry their luggage ALL the way from the parking lot to the houses.

Wish the team luck as they visit Occidental College on Saturday, and come out to cheer them on as they play Pomona-Pitzer on Tuesday right here at Caltech.
