

Erin-Kate Escobar: Dual Destinies

Erin-Kate Escobar is not the type to hide who she is.

Unlike most of the office doors in the Caltech Center for Diversity, hers is plastered with posters and stickers. An orange paper-sized sheet underneath the glass pane in her door simply says, “You belong here”; a square sticker below it reads, “Bisexual Yesterday, Today, And Tomorrow,” printed on the pink, purple and blue stripes of the bi pride flag. Six small fliers and decals are wedged in the glass pane.

One, a business card for a Women in Science program in Ontario, hints at her role as the Center for Diversity’s singular women’s resource coordinator. Escobar supports the Women Mentoring Women program, coordinates various events across campus, and acts as a confidential resource for those who want to vent about sexual harassment or other issues without having the contents of their venting reported.

Inside, Escobar’s office setup mirrors the duality of her roles as organizer and resource. On one side sits her desk, cleared save for a small pile of folders. A corkboard occupying over half the wall next to it is covered with greeting cards, art and photographs of her with students and friends. Three different calendars are pinned just above her computer: two monthly calendars, set to May and June; and a third smaller two-year one. Six small and well-watered succulents line her windowsill, while her bike lies just below the window.

The other side of her office is occupied by an unassuming coffee table, several plush chairs, and

a small, inviting couch. The bookshelf in the back corner, filled to the brim with women’s literature, also contains a shelf dedicated to craft supplies; one container is aptly labeled the “feather management box.”

Apparent is her aptitude for handling endless calendars and seventeen-page-long to-do lists, a skill she possessed from a young age. “I look back at my planners from high school,” Escobar said, bemused, “and I don’t know if I was thirty when I was fourteen or if I’m still my fourteen year old self, because the amount of meetings and planning and scheduling I did then is about the same as it is now.”

Outside her office, Escobar is a force of unyielding positivity on campus, rarely seen without a smile. Upon first meeting her, it’s hard not to notice her immediately personable nature.

“You’re so comfortable around her that you can share all your deepest darkest secrets within the first five minutes of talking to her, whether you thought you were going to or not,” said Brittany Kamai, a Caltech postdoc and close friend of Escobar.

She also “has the fantastic ability to see a conflict and figure out what miscommunication caused it, instead of getting angry about it,” said Alyssa Poletti, a junior who has worked with her for the last two years as part of Feminist Club excomm.

Though she almost seems born for the role of diversity center coordinator, and has a Master’s in alternative higher education to boot, Escobar never intended to return to the education sector after college. Her mother, father and stepfather all were educators, but her plan

after high school in Santa Cruz was to work in politics to help make change for the most people possible. Her undergraduate degree in politics at the University of San Francisco led her to summer internships in San Francisco politicians’ offices and nonprofits in D.C.

But regarding her apparent change of heart at the end of college, she said: “I was like, ‘Oh my gosh, I’m a queer Jewish woman of color! I have intersecting multiple identities, and the world’s not ready for me to lead them as a politician!’ They’d want to put me back in boxes and simplify me, and I don’t want to be simplified. I don’t want to have to represent just the Latinos, or just the women, because I feel more complex than that as a genderqueer, mixed-race, multi-ethnic human. So I went, ‘Well, I guess that’s not for me.’”

So, following college, Escobar tried on many different hats. She started volunteer gardening in Syria, Lebanon and Jordan — she minored in Arabic during college — and eventually took that love of the outdoors to a position as programming director at a California urban gardening nonprofit in Oakland. She adored the position initially, but she was working eighty-hour weeks there, and “got to the point where (she) wanted to walk in front of a car instead of go to work,” she said, and left.

At her next nonprofit, she supported over 800 cyclists biking a route from San Francisco to Los Angeles

to raise money for HIV research. Though she liked the job overall, her favorite part was helping coach and motivate the cyclists, and she realized that was the role for her.

At that point, Escobar called up a mentor from her undergrad, a diversity center employee who doubled as the school’s LGBTQ club adviser. When asked how he attained his position, he directed her to his previous Master’s program at the University of Vermont; she applied and was accepted. In her next two years there, she still got to simultaneously coach and return to conflict resolution and dialogue work, which she hadn’t done since college. It was here that she discovered how much she enjoyed teaching and working with groups of people in a nontraditional education setting, a realization that set the stage for the application to her current position.

Although her friends and colleagues concur on how well she fits her role, Escobar’s strengths can sometimes be her downfall.

“Because she has such a big heart, I think it’s hard for her to operationalize the amount of time that some things take,” said Hanna Song, the senior director for diversity in the CCD. JPL had approached Escobar for planning a diversity training, and, as Song recalled, “She went, ‘Yes, we can do six trainings in one month!’” at a time when she already had multiple trainings planned at Caltech. Her people-pleasing nature can make it

difficult for her to prioritize her own needs and manage the boundaries between professional and amicable relationships. Though Poletti loves her positivity, she said, “Sometimes, I just want her to get angry at all the injustice in the world.”

Escobar readily acknowledges her shortcomings, admitting that it’s sometimes difficult for her to stop working. Though she makes sure to rest — taking walks, hiking, biking, or swimming in order to recharge — she said she’s “really bad at taking time just to do nothing,” sometimes feeling guilty when not running errands on her breaks.

She also recognizes that her role as a confidential resource, while one she adores, is often emotionally draining.

“I feel like there’s a constant search of what the right balance of emotional labor to put out is, and what it means to be a queer person of color who offers the amount of emotional labor that I think I’m required to offer in my job. So I think I’m constantly looking for mentors and building blocks of humans I can surround myself with or read stories of ... and see who I want to be.”

However, she’s clear that she doesn’t see her faults as permanent; she just needs to learn how better to climb the mountains.

“I am what I want to be when I grow up,” she said, “but I also have a lot of growing up to do.”

- ASCIT held a Huntington Gardens event on May 12. 70 tickets were distributed.




